They became fully emersed in the incredible activities, food and culture that Sri Lanka had to offer, and we hope that they all made memories that will stay with them for a lifetime.

After all the travelling it was good to get active, with Mrs Shoubridge and Miss West putting us through a range of drills and match play. The facilities were good, but we all struggled to adapt to playing in 30+ degree heat without air conditioning!

The following day we returned to Colombo for our first match. The B team played first and were all keen to put into play the things we had worked on the day before. A lot of the team had not played together before, but the teamwork developed over the course of the game, and everyone was feeling more confident by the final whistle. Our first Player of the Match was Isla for her remarkable determination and never-give-up attitude.

Then the A team played, also taking a while to get into the game, with some silly mistakes that allowed the opposition to turnover possession. After settling down, we began to be more consistent and finished with a victory to QEGS.
